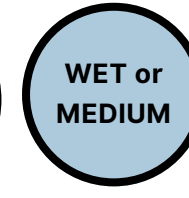


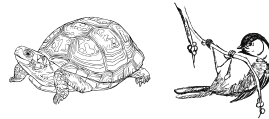
Arisaema triphyllum

Jack-in-the-Pulpit

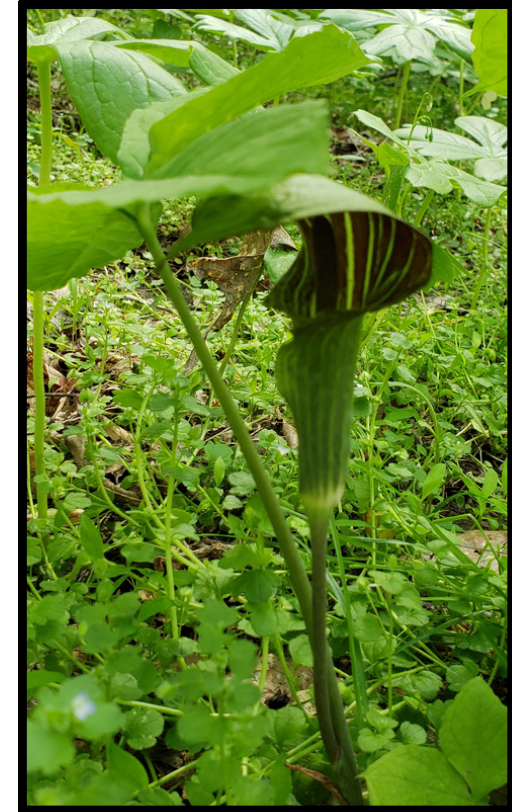
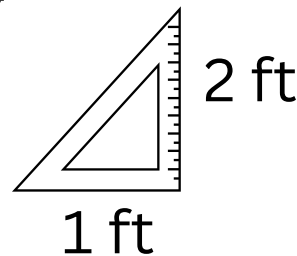


Excellent semi-ephemeral woodland garden plant with a unique flower. **Easy to cultivate**, requires little care once established, preferring **rich soil, shady, seasonally wet locations under deciduous trees.**

Wildlife Value: Songbirds and eastern box turtles eat the berries.

Did you know?



The Jack-in-the-Pulpit plant has the ability to change gender. A plant that starts out as male can spontaneously change to female the next year and vice versa. Flowering plants become hermaphroditic as they mature (male flowers on the upper part of spadix and female on the lower part). Most plants in a colony are ephemeral, vanishing into dormancy by mid-summer, but the mature, hermaphroditic flowering plant will produce a cluster of red berries in mid to late summer.
